Nick Moore works at the Baptist theological seminary in Gweru, Zimbabwe, where he trains pastors and laborers. As International Mission Board missionaries, Nick and his wife, Kyndra, along with ther seven children, have the joy of pairing their gifts with those of our African brothers and sisters to advance God's kingdom. The Moores help send out students from the seminary to serve as pastors and plant new churches across this landlocked nation located in the souther part of Africa. A chicken project run by the seminary helps cover students' fees. The project also assists widows caring for nearby orphans. Nick has hopes to expand the community outreach using the seminary's land.

As real people with real struggles, the Moores are able to see God use them in their weakness. "I'm not a huge fan of people calling missionaries heroes," Nick said. "If you see a missionary who is effective and able to persevere in difficult places, you're not seeing a strong person. You're seeing God's power perfected in weakness."

Nick encourages churches and believers back in the US to be faithful. "We are one part of the body and we cannot function without the others doing their role."

Pray with Nick and his family for faith to persever. Lift up the Zimbabwean laborers whom they are grateful to serve alongside. The Moores are confident God has great plans to use these brothers and sisters. Ask God to give Nick and his family a humility to trust Him and be the vessels they need to be.

TJ's Take

As Americans, we often assume that our freedom to exercise our faith will always be protected by our Constitutional rights. In fact, many of us are unable to relate to the biblical call to suffer well in the face of persecution. As a result, persecution for Christians is just something that happens in other places across the world—far away from the safety of the land of the free.

But in the midst of the lockdowns related to COVID-19, we have seen the possibility of persecution in our nation increase significantly. Churches have been unfairly targeted, whether directly or indirectly, in many ways over the course of the past year.

Just to our north in Canada, we have seen a serious attack on one particular local church which has dared to gather for worship in the midst of Canada's strict lockdowns. In recent days, Grace Life Church in the province of Alberta has faced increasing levels of government persecution.

In the early stages of the high restrictions from COVID-19, Grace Life willingly complied with governmental lockdowns. However, over the course of time, the restrictions in Alberta have remained incredibly strict. "Having engaged in an immense amount of research, interacting with both doctors and frontline healthcare workers," Grace Life Church reasoned, "it is apparent that the negative effects of the government lockdown measures on society far surpass the effects of COVID-19."

And so, after much prayer and preparation, in obedience to the commands in Scripture for the church to gather together for corporate worship, the church began to meet in gatherings beyond the capacity limits placed by the Canadian government.

The government did not back down. James Coates, the pastor of Grace Life Church and a husband and father of two children, was arrested and jailed for a month before being released. After his release, the government constructed a fence to surround the church building in order to prevent the church from meeting, and they even sent more than 200 law enforcement officers to their campus on a Sunday morning in an attempt to intimidate and prevent their gathering.

We often think something of this sort will never happen here in America. Perhaps it won't. But what if it does? How will we respond as a church?

If it does happen here, we shouldn't be surprised. Jesus says in John 15 that the world hates us. And as 1 Peter 4 tells us, "Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you." American Christians have been spared from this kind of action in our nation's history, but persecution and trials are not a strange thing. We should expect them. And when they come, Peter continues, "But

rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when his glory is revealed."

As counterintuitive as it might seem, we are to rejoice when we share in Christ's sufferings. Jesus teaches the same thing in Matthew 5:11–12 when he says, "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Paul tells us in Philippians 1:29 that suffering is a gift that has been granted to us. And the apostles model that perspective when they were beaten and ordered to stop proclaiming the good news of Christ. In response, Acts 5:41 tells us, "Then they left the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the name."

If suffering comes—if we face persecution of any kind here—will you be ready? Will you stand for Christ? Will you rejoice that we might be counted worthy to suffer dishonor for the name of our Lord?

Psalm 2 says that the governments of the earth come together to set themselves against God—they conspire to reject the Sovereign Ruler of the universe. They put pastors in prison and put up fences around church buildings and send hundreds of law enforcement officers to intimidate and persecute the gathered church. But Psalm 2 also says, "He who sits in the heavens laughs; the LORD holds them in derision."

We do not serve a God who can be threatened by the schemes of men. So, if persecution comes, we can stand. Because our God laughs at them. We know that he is in the heavens—that he sovereignly rules and reigns over his creation. Yes, in this world we will have trouble. But we take heart, because Christ has overcome the world.

Church Connect APP

Church Connect, the member portal for our database, can now function as an app on your iPhone or Android device. It is a web app and not a native app; therefore, it cannot be installed from a "store" on your device. As such, it is launched from a shortcut (icon) on the home screen. Keep reading to learn more about creating the shortcut. (NOTE: 1. For iPhone users, these instructions primarily work with the Safari browser. 2. If you have previously installed a shortcut to Church Connect, you will need to delete it and create a new shortcut for app functionality.)

The Church Connect web app still displays the same content as our Connect page. But when used as a web app, it runs in a special "standalone" mode which means it doesn't feel like a webpage.
